



Your Food Stamps May STOP

If You are not Working or Enrolled in Training/School

New Law Effective January 1, 2016

Why am I getting this letter?

- You are age 18 to 49, and receiving Food Stamps.
- As of January 1, 2016, you must work, or participate in an approved training program/school, **80 hours each month** or your Food Stamp benefits may **STOP!**
 - ✓ If you are **not** working, or enrolled in an approved training program/school, you can only get Food Stamps for **3 months total** for a three-year period (January 2016 through December 2018).

What if I am already working or enrolled in training/school?

- **Let us know immediately if you are working or enrolled in training/school!** Your food stamps will not stop if you complete 80 hours each month.
 - ✓ Call the Family Support Division at **855-373-4636**, or go to any FSD Resource Center, to see if your work or training/school meets the 80-hour per month requirement.

Who can help me meet the new requirements?

- Effective January 1, 2016, you can go to any Job Center, or call **1-888-728- JOBS (5627)**. They can:
 - ✓ Help you find job training.
 - ✓ Refer you to jobs in your area.
 - ✓ Help you find the resources you need to be successful in work and training.

You may not have to work or be in training/school if any of the following apply to you.

Call now to find out!

Call the Family Support Division at **855-373-4636**, or go to any FSD Resource Center, if:

- You are unable to work due to an illness, injury, or disability.
- You are under 18.
- You are 50 or older.
- You have children in your SNAP household under 18.
- You are pregnant.
- You are a full-time student.
- You are required to care for an ill or incapacitated household member.
- You are receiving unemployment (in any state).
- You are attending a drug or alcohol treatment program.
